REAL ID Extended to May 7, 2025

The Department of Homeland Security extended the REAL ID deadline to May 7, 2025. The REAL ID Act established minimum security standards for state-issued driver's licenses and identification cards and prohibits Federal agencies from accepting for official purposes licenses and identification cards from states that do not meet these standards. Beginning May 7, 2025, every state and territory resident will need to present a REAL ID compliant license/ID, or another acceptable form of ID for boarding commercial aircraft, accessing Federal facilities and entering nuclear plants. The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) considers a current passport or military ID acceptable identification for boarding an aircraft. Don't assume other driver will stop after crash What motorists should do if they're victims of a hit-and-run

ou're driving on a busy highway when you notice a speeding car coming up quickly behind you. It's zigzagging between lanes, narrowly missing other cars. Before you can react, it catches up with you – and clips your car's rear end.

Momentarily stunned, you ask if your passengers are OK, and you start to pull to the side of the road. Then, you get a second shock: The perpetrator is racing away, clearly with no intention of stopping to exchange insurance information.

That's when you realize you're the victim of a hit-and-run driver. At this point, you know the normal post-crash procedures don't necessarily apply. But how can you make sure your insurance claim goes smoothly? Keep the following tips in mind:

DO pull over to a safe place and write down as much information about the other driver and the collision as you can remember. Some or all of the other driver's license plate would be great. But even the other car's make, model and color can help, along with the direction it was headed and any damage the car might have sustained.

DO take pictures of your car and

the area in which the crash occurred if it is safe to do so. Time-stamped photos of the road and weather conditions, as well as traffic flow, can assist with your claim.

DO ask any witnesses to describe what they saw, and write down their testimony, names and contact information, so that your claims adjuster can contact them, if necessary.

DO call the police. If the damage is minor or no one is injured, the police might not come to the crash scene. However, your auto insurance policy might require you to notify the police of any hit-and-run accident. If that's the case, be sure to file a police report, whether at the scene,

by phone or at the police station.

DO report the collision accurately when you call your insurer. Intentionally misrepresenting facts about an accident could lead to a suspicion of fraud. Insurance companies are able to easily recognize whether a vehicle came into contact with another vehicle and whether it was in motion when it sustained damage.

In many cases, either the victim, a witness or a surveillance camera can supply enough information for the police to find the fleeing driver. If a hit-and-run driver is caught, he or she could face these serious penalties: fines up to \$10,000 and prison time, depending on the severity of the damage or injuries caused by the crash. Plus, the DMV could put points on the driver's license; the driver's insurer, if he or she has one, could cancel coverage; and anyone injured in the accident could sue.

DON'T play detective and chase the other car. You might be tempted to try to get the license-plate number for your claim, but that could result in unsafe driving and worsen the situation. Remember: As long as you have the appropriate coverage, your insurance company should assist in repairing your car.

Annual new car costs rise above \$12K Record prices, 90% increase in finance rates drive numbers

he yearly cost to drive a motor vehicle continues to rise.

AAA's Your Driving Costs

a data source for expenses associated with owning and operating a new vehicle – finds that the average cost of owning and operating a new vehicle in 2023 increased significantly. The annual expense of \$12,182 – or \$1,015 monthly – is a sharp increase from 2022, when the average cost topped at \$10,728 – \$894 monthly.

"It's important for car buyers to clearly understand the costs associated with owning a new vehicle," said Greg Brannon, AAA's director of automotive research. "Due to global supply-chain issues and constrained inventory of new vehicles, car prices rose dramatically in 2022. And while the situation continues to improve, the spillover effects are keeping prices high."

The overall average manufacturer's suggested retail price (MSRP) of new vehicles in 2023 increased to \$34,976 – an annual increase of \$1,575 from the previous year. It's important to note that MSRP does not always correspond to a consumer's actual purchase price and might vary depending on demand. A higher sticker price directly impacted finance costs, with vehicles boasting an average annual finance of \$1,253 – a 90% increase from the previous year.

The change in the annual cost of owning a new vehicle also is likely driven by:

- Depreciation, which is the difference between the car's value upon purchase and the value of the car when sold. According to 2023's YDC projections, new vehicles are expected to depreciate by an average of \$4,538 per year over five years of ownership up 22% from 2022.
- The jump in new vehicle prices compared to used-vehicle values that have experienced a decline in the past year.

 Automakers have focused on producing more oversized, luxurious and expensive vehicles loaded with extra features that increase prices even more.

Compared to 2022, fuel ranked among one of the higher annual cost categories. The average cost per miles in 2023 decreased roughly 2 cents per mile. Meanwhile, the cost of charging EVs increased by nearly 2 cents per kWh from 2022. It went from 13.9 cents per kWh to 15.8 cents. The increase is likely accounted for by higher-than-expected inflation, according to the U.S. Energy Information Administration.

Given their size, fuel economy and prices, it should come as no surprise that half-ton pickups have the highest average driving costs among all vehicle categories covered in the YDC study. Pickup trucks excel at hauling and towing, although many buyers don't use them for these purposes. Potential buyers should be aware that the unique capabilities of pickups come at a high cost of more than \$1 per mile.

The pickup market has slowed over the past 12 months, with gas prices trending higher and financial costs climbing.

"The once popular pickup truck is now seeing a slight decline in demand as these vehicles have become increasingly expensive, rivaling the price of many luxury cars," said Brannon. "As interest rates continue to climb, this adds a layer of expense per month that consumers should consider when shopping for their next vehicle."

But the most popular vacations I book daily are trips to warm destinations like Mexico, the Caribbean and Costa Rica! This

September, I was happy to return to Costa Rica with a coach full of travel professionals to do hotel site inspections. Seeing so many properties first-hand provided invaluable insights when recommending properties to our members.

We flew into Liberia airport and stayed at the Secrets Papagayo Resort – a stunning all-inclusive property with lush gardens on the gulf. The resort is large and hilly with a black-sand beach. It's a great getaway for clients who want an adults-only resort. It's a large spread-out property, not suitable if you have mobility issues. We also toured the nearby

Planet Hollywood, which is an all-ages getaway with a party atmosphere.

Farther north, we toured Dreams Las Mareas in popular Guanacaste near the tropical rainforest. Dreams caters to couples and families. Rooms are decorated with natural-wood tones to complement the natural landscape. It was easy to get around and the property had a white-sand beach. My favorite resort experience was watching the loveable monkeys swinging high in the Guanacaste trees. Nearby

activities included whitewater rafting and hiking in the rainforest.

Also in Guanacaste is the Westin Reserve Conchal, a golf and tennis resort with a lagoon-style pool. It's a quieter resort and it provides golf carts. The only downside to me was the vendors on the beach, but the shoppers liked it! Next door is the upscale W Hotel Reserva Conchal, with its unique rooms, including the stunning Sunset Treehouse Room, with views of the mangrove forest

from your private balcony!

What was my favorite and most unexpected experience? Tamarindo. We toured the Tamarindo Diria – one of the most iconic beach resorts. This charming resort is on Costa Rica's most famous beach, so you can enjoy 1.8 miles of white sand just a few steps from your room.

My choice for romance, celebrations and honeymoons is the Casa Chameleon at Las Catalinas. The rooms are spacious with plunge pools and the food is out of this world. They also have a wine cellar.

We toured the Mistico Hanging Bridges and did a Jungle cruise, but my sightseeing highlight was seeing Arenal Volcano and the Hot Springs. Arenal Springs Resort and Spa is an active resort with an animal sanctuary, rock-climbing wall, and river for rafting and tubing, along with the hot springs. My overall favorite hot-spring experience was at the Tabacon Thermal Resort and Spa. The hotel was separate from the spring down the road. The property was huge with dozens of pools.

My tips for your trip are to bring B.D.P – Bug Spray, Dramamine and Patience. The road infrastructure is winding and some are gravel and rough. It takes longer than expected to get where you are going. And do a guided tour, so your guide can navigate the roads and point out the animals along the way!

Scotland's islands more than window dressing Natural beauty, history comes to life on country's army of isles

t could be called the "Land of 1,000 Islands" and it wouldn't be a stretch. That's Scotland, the United Kingdom country that has more than 790 offshore islands – nearly 100 inhabited.

Island hopping isn't a cliché in Scotland; it's a sport. But these aren't your typical isles. They're home to rocky, weather-beaten coasts, white beaches, rugged mountains, heather-clad moorland and tranquil inland lochs.

Most of these islands share unique personalities. They have stories to tell anyone who's willing to stop by and listen

Whisky is synonymous with the Isle of Islay. Coveted by connoisseurs for its peaty, smoky flavor, it's a rare treat. The island houses nine distilleries, including Lagavulin and Ardbeg, which translates from the Gaelic term for a "dark and mysterious place."

The Laphroaig distillery offers "Water to Whisky Experience," a 4.5-hour tour that includes visiting the water source and tasting from a selection of casks. The Gaelic term for whisky is "Uisge Beatha" or "water of life"

The Isle of Lewis is home to Lews Castle that presides over Stornoway.

It's the largest island in the Outer Hebrides. The Standing Stones of Calanais date 5,000 years and centerpiece the ritual landscape. Winds rage around this northern headland, making it the windiest spot in the U.K.

Majestic cliffs and sea stacks populate Orkney's coastline, including the striking Old Man of Hoy. Skara Brae is a 5,000-year-old village and the best-preserved Neolithic site in Western Europe. Skara Brae thrived as a community well before the building of Stonehenge or the Egyptian pyramids. Stone walls, passageways and stone furnishings – including beds and dressers – remain intact.

Skara Brae is part of the Heart of Orkney World Heritage Site. It's joined by Maeshowe, a chambered tomb, the Stones of Stenness and the Ring of Brodgar. Guests can explore the Viking Cathedral that dominates the skyline of Kirkwall, Orkney's ancient capital.

Scotland meets Scandinavia and the North Sea meets the Atlantic Ocean in Shetland. Partially submerged ancient hills formed archipelago's series of islands. Thousands of sea caves, open sandy bays and sheltered sea lochs are onsite. Words from the Old Norse language are preserved not only in placenames but also in Shetland dialect that is used daily. Shetland ponies can be seen throughout the islands – grazing by roadside or on the heathery hills.

Cuillin – the isle of Skye – is famous for its breathtaking scenery. Dramatic sea cliffs and towering slopes define its personality. Named "Cloud Island" in Old Norse, it's the largest of the Inner Hebrides and the most popular island with visitors. Mealt waterfall cascades 180 feet, highlighting gorgeous scenery. Neist Point Lighthouse stands watch over the island's western tip near Glendale.

Scotland might better be name "Scotlands". It's a country blessed with history and an island waiting to tell a story.

Unique roads rumble to different tunes Singing highways come to life in California, New Mexico

usic plays an integral role in our driving experiences – especially on road trips. Tunes spice up the route. Dialing to your favorite radio station or synching your smartphone has you jamming to your favorite singers and bands.

It's an ideal way to pass the time, but have you ever thought of the road providing the melodies? Only a few highways in the world offer this unique opportunity and two of them are in the U.S.

Singing highways make literal symphonies from streets. It seems impossible, but careful planning and mathematics make this possible. It's not magic; it's science.

Music is the result of vibrations. The speed of those vibrations dictates how sound waves are interpreted through the human ear. Certain speeds correlate specific notes on the scale. For example, 330 vibrations per second translates into an E note.

It *sounds* simple, but to reproduce them on the treads of tires involves more work. The rubber wheels are triggered by rumble strips – bumps that warn sleepy drivers to remain alert – and spacing them in a particular way produces the proper vibrational pattern to register a specific pitch.

Other automotive factors come

into play to make the roads sing. Tire size makes a difference in sound quality and – just as music – timing and speed play leading roles in success.

Ingenuity comes to life. Engineers choose a speed at which they assume a vehicle will pass over the strips. A vehicle traveling 45 mph will require

330 strips per second to hear and E note – or one rumble strip every 2.4 inches.

The effort is dizzying but the payoff is priceless. It brings a new sense to sightseeing.

The U.S.'s dueling highways can be found in California and New Mexico.

Rather than competing pianos, it's more like repeating rumble strips.

Lancaster, California's Avenue G is a nondescript trip of road about 90 minutes northwest of Los Angeles. It's the first of its kind in the U.S.

The highway sings the "William Tell Overture." Honda tuned it up in 2008 as part of a marketing campaign.

Travelers are warned of the oncoming song about a mile from the strips, which are located between the town's 30th and 40th Street West. Motorists should take the left-hand lane and maintain a speed 55 mph for the best results.

Meanwhile, New Mexico's Route 66 has its own roadway opus along a 490-yard section located between markers 4 and 5, between Albuquerque and Tiieras.

Completed in 2014, it's more tuned than California's road, playing the ending of "America the Beautiful" for drivers who find themselves motoring along the rumble strips.

Drivers are warned of the queuedup tune from about a mile away and speed plays a key role in hearing the correct notes. The song plays perfectly at 45 mph.

Perhaps the next singing road to be constructed could be named "Tom Cochrane Road".

"Life is a Highway" certainly would be a fitting tune.

AAA analysis underscores car seat safety Data reveal nearly half of children injured not in car seat

ew analysis from AAA examined five years of crash data from the U.S. Department of Transportation and points to a lack of proper child-restraint use among children injured or killed in car crashes.

The results of this analysis, released by AAA and car seat leader Chicco USA, uncovered that nearly half (48%) of children ages 10 and younger who were injured and half (51%) who were killed in car crashes were using a vehicle seatbelt prematurely or no restraint instead of a car seat.

Families spend a significant amount of time on the road and, from 2017-21, more than 3.9 million children ages 10 and younger were involved in crashes while riding in a vehicle, 527,000 were injured and 2,789 were killed.

"AAA's in-depth analysis of crash data has brought to light safety issues that concern us, and we're in a position to help by sharing our expert resources about car seat safety use factors such as proper seat installation, type of seat and mode of use at each stage of child growth," said William Hasse, vice president of marketing, Chicco USA.

Infant seats, boosters and seatbelts will effectively protect young passengers when used properly. The U.S. Department of Transportation found

that child restraints reduce fatalities by 71% for infants younger than 1 and by 54% of children 1 to 4 years old in passenger cars.

According to AAA's analysis, the most recent data from the DoT reflects a need for parents to ensure they are using the correct child-restraint system for each phase of growth. Chicco

Child Passenger Safety Technician Josh Dilts offers the following advice for families:

Don't skip the booster phase – The data decreased by more than half in car seat use from age 7 to age 8, an age that saw significant injuries reported. Many parents must not know that seat belt fit is more about the child's height

than age (many state laws focus on age only). Based on their size, children upwards of 10 years old may benefit from using a booster seat. Most booster seats accommodate children as tall as 57 inches

Children should always use a restraint when riding in vehicles – Shifting from a car seat to a vehicle seatbelt too early isn't the only issue. Nearly four in 10 children, ages 7-10, killed in a car crash, were completely unrestrained and, of the youngest children (ages 0-3), nearly one in four who were killed were unrestrained. Chicco's Dilts notes that the use of restraints, which is defined by this dataset as not using a car seat, booster seat, seatbelt or strapped into the vehicle in any manner, is alarming.

"Parents should be diligent in ensuring their child is properly restrained in the car before it is in motion, especially if the child is not old enough to secure themselves," said Dilts.

Use available resources – Chicco offers the most recent car seat guidelines, installation tutorials and caregiver FAQs on ChiccoUSA.com. Local fire departments often have a child passenger safety technician on hand who can check if your car seat is correctly installed. For more resources, visit AAA.com.

Badlands is just too good to pass up South Dakota natural masterpiece opens minds and souls

much better than at Badlands National Park.
A jewel in South Dakota, its incredible rock formations, expansive horizons and animals attract more than 1 million visitors annually. They arrive with high expectations and leave in awe.

'atural beauty doesn't get

Badlands is the result of millions of years of rock formations and erosions that have made it one of the most impressive environmental attractions in the U.S. The park's 244,000 acres protect an expanse of mixed-grass prairie that today are populated by bison, bighorn sheep, prairie dogs and black-footed ferrets. Many of the creatures roaming Badlands include some of the most endangered species in North America.

Badlands is nirvana for stargazers. The sky opens up at night. Its remote location and dearth of light pollution creates a perfectly dark palette to showcase the brightest stars. It's clarity reveals constellations, the moon, satellites and airplanes.

But the unique darkness allows visitors to see planets, the Milky Way, star clusters, nebulae, the International Space Station, shooting stars and occasionally the aurora borealis – aka the northern lights.

Badlands' natural wonders share similar splendor. Clastic Dikes are

impossible to miss. They are vertical sheets of rock that crosscut the horizontal layers of the badlands. They normally are a different color than the surrounding rock, with tan, green and red shades most common. Many of the spectacular ridges and spires in the park are partially supported by clastic dilear.

Sod tables reside throughout the prairie land. These rarities are broken sections of grass and soil that sit atop badlands material. The different rates of erosion make it appear as if sod tables are springing out of the Badlands, where they actually are wearing away more slowly than the rock surrounding them

Most archaeological sites found in Badlands have been discovered in sod tables, including those surrounding the Ancient Hunters Overlook. Tools, pottery, charcoal fragments and butchered bison bones from ancient inhabitants are preserved in the sod – some as long as 12,000 years.

Badlands Loop State Scenic Byway is recommended to visitors as the best way to tour the park. It's a two-lane, 31-mile stretch that passes through buttes, cliffs and multi-colored spires. Drive cautiously. Wildlife roam the area and could wander onto parts of the roadway.

The highway contains numerous passes, 15 overlooks and eight trails. Big Badlands Overlook and the Door, Window and Notch Trail are must-visit attractions, as well as Pinnacles Overlook and Yellow Mounds Overlook.

Badlands is home to one of the richest fossil beds in the world. Tourists can visit the Fossil Preparation Lab. Watch park paleontologists perform fossil preparation. It includes identifying species based on fossil characteristics, removing rock from fossils and preparing and cataloguing finished specimens for display.

There are plenty of sights to witness. Visitors should take their time and absorb all Badlands has to offer. It's certain to be a good time.

inter-driving season is most challenging to our nerves, vehicles and skills. The scenario is too familiar. Temperatures drop, snow falls and ice forms. It's a losing trifecta.

Slippery roads cause many of us to shudder behind the wheel. Our familiar commutes just became a treacherous nightmare.

Snow and ice, meanwhile, aren't the only culprits. Fewer hours of daylight obscure our vision and the sun's glare reflecting off the snow can have a blinding effect.

Rapidly changing weather conditions make it essential drivers remain alert and vigilant. Here are 10 winter-driving tips to help make the experience safer and less stressful:

- Monitor weather and travel conditions. Know the difference between a Winter Storm Watch and Winter Weather Advisory, and how they could impact your plans. Allow for extra time to travel, wait for conditions to improve or stay home if possible.
- Think cautiously if you must drive in wintry conditions. Make sure your fuel tank is full. Clear all snow from the hood, roof, windows and lights of your vehicle. Clear windows of fog before driving. Make sure the windshield-wiper fluid is full and wipers are in good condition. Turn

- on the headlights when you turn on your windshield wipers.
- Increase your following distance.
 Focus as far ahead as possible. Avoid hard braking. It could keep you from sliding into another vehicle or barrier.
- Not all vehicles respond similarly to icy, slippery roads. Familiarize yourself with the vehicle's braking system, tire tractions and
- all-wheel-drive systems. Avoid using cruise control in wintry conditions.
- Don't panic if your vehicle becomes trapped in a storm or snowbank. Avoid overexertion and exposure and stay in the vehicle. Run the motor sparingly and keep fresh air in the vehicle. Stay moving and don't fall asleep. Stay alert for traffic and

first-responders.

- Try to avoid secondary roads and drive with caution. Measure your speed to road and weather conditions. Avoid passing other vehicles when road conditions are at their worst. Bridges, ramps and overpasses freeze first.
- Plan your route and make sure someone knows which way you will be traveling, your destination and expected arrival time, especially when driving long distances. Report a safe arrival.
- Leave room for maintenance vehicles and plows. Remain at least 200 feet behind them.
- Carry a winter-survival kit in the trunk or storage area of your vehicle. Fully charge your cell phone; and always keep a road map, flashlight, first-aid kit, blanket and shovel in your vehicle.
- And most importantly, drive slowly. Take your time. The posted speed limits are meant for dry pavement.

Cold weather can be unkind to battery Take steps to reduce chances it leaves you in bad spot

old weather affects your battery more than any engine component. Batteries are filled with fluid, most of which is water. They are susceptible to freezing if a battery is not fully charged.

Cold also thickens engine oil, forcing the battery to work harder when starting the car. Your vehicle's battery loses approximately 35% of its efficiency when the temperature dips below freezing and nearly as much as 60% of its efficiency when the temperature falls below zero

Slow cranking is a common sign your battery might be getting weak but diagnosing battery problems can be tricky. Your battery terminals could be calcified, or a parasitic draw, often from a mobile device, is draining its power. Unplug your phone and charger when you don't need them.

AAA also recommends you take these special precautions with your vehicle's battery this winter:

- Have the starting and charging systems tested every year.
- On frigid days, shut off the heater fans, radio and other devices before cranking the engine.
- Inspect the battery cables, posts and fasteners. Cable corrosion prevents power from flowing freely from the battery, reducing the power available to start the car. Clean the battery terminals with a wire brush or battery-cleaner spray.

- Avoid short trips. It can take as long as 30 minutes for a car battery to fully charge. Short trips can diminish the amount of reserve capacity.
- Preventative measures such as garaging your vehicles or using a battery charger like the AAA Battery Tender – can help extend a battery's lifespan.

Winter also means fewer hours of daylight and increased use of lights, wipers and heating, all of which extract a heavy toll on your battery. The more electrical devices in the car – such as

electronic fuel-injection systems, power windows and infotainment systems – the more power the battery should have.

Your best defense against failure is a fully charged battery and adequate cold-cranking amps – 500-700 – depending on the type of engine in your vehicle.
